I am an activist involved in various activities opposing horizontal fracking in Michigan. I live in Charlevoix County, a few counties over from the above Marathon facility. I am also in touch with several landowners near it.

I have visited D4-11 two or three times, including last Friday when I spoke the Marathon safety man named Trace \_\_\_\_\_. He gave me your card and said you would be the one to answer questions.

I am concerned that the Ensign 161 drill rig on the site -- which by appearances rises nearly 200 feet from the ground (including infrastructure) -may be exploring for gas in preparation for more wells similar to the horizontal production wells on a nearby pad, State Beaver Creek 1-23 and 1-14 HD1. (The latter has been permitted and drilling is about to start.)

DEQ, Michigan's regulatory agency, has been loathe to say anything about D4-11. It will not provide a copy of the application or permit, or even give the permit number, citing confidentiality provisions of the mineral-well part of our non-renewable resource law.

Will Marathon provide these documents and confirm (as Trace \_\_\_\_\_ did) that D4-11 is exploring for oil and gas?
